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Looking Through the Glass of Ecofeminism: Margaret Atwood *The Edible Women*



Atwood has won numerous awards and honours for her writing, including two Booker Prizes and Lifetime Achievement Awards. A number of her works have been adapted for film and television (web).

Atwood's works encompass a variety of themes including gender and identity, religion and myth, the power of language, climate change, and "power politics". Many of her poems are inspired by myths and fairy tales which interested her from a very early age. Some of her well-known works include, *The Edible Woman, Surfacing, The Handmaid's Tale, The Cats Eye, The Blind Assassin,*
